DESCRIPTION

Continuation of Arabic Language and Muslim Cultures 331.

Prerequisites: ALMC 331 or Arabic placement exam.

The University of Calgary has a formal process for Arabic language course placement. Information about course placement can be found at: https://slllc.ucalgary.ca/arabic-languages-and-muslim-cultures. Students who want to enrol in an Arabic course must complete the placement form (https://slllc.ucalgary.ca/placement/) and any follow-up testing required by the ALMC program. Students must follow this process in order to remain in Arabic courses.

OBJECTIVES

Increasing students' abilities in listening, speaking, reading, and writing Modern Standard Arabic in its cultural contexts through the study of oral and written texts from a variety of genres as well as through dedicated attention to Arabic vocabulary and grammar. Expanding students' vocabulary and expressions from the genres of academic prose, news media, and short stories. Reinforcing and expanding students' knowledge of Arabic grammar through attention to the grammatical structures in these texts.

OUTCOMES

Students will improve their Modern Standard Arabic comprehension and production, aiming toward the advanced high level of language proficiency. They will achieve higher levels of listening, speaking, reading, and writing as well as expand their knowledge of vocabulary, grammar, and Arab cultures. They will gain exposure to the genres of academic prose, news media, and short stories and be able to understand, write, and speak about texts in these genres.

COURSE NOTES

Course expectations:

Active class participation, graded on a scale of 0-2 daily, involves speaking up in class, engaging in group activities during class, paying attention to what your instructor and classmates are saying, active listening, and following any instructions the instructor gives. Making mistakes is a normal part of language learning and does not harm your participation grade. If you are absent from class, you cannot gain participation points for that day. Being very late to class, leaving early, and being disruptive in class will impact your participation grade. There will be no opportunity to make up for missed participation, but absences due to documented medical conditions and personal emergencies will be considered excused.

<u>Homework assignments</u> will be graded on a scale of 0-2 for completion, timeliness, and reflecting understanding of the material. It is your responsibility to submit your homework before leaving class. You may study and do homework with other students in your class, but you must always write your own answers *independently*.

<u>Short quizzes</u> will occur at the beginning of class roughly once per week. They will check that you are learning the vocabulary of our recent course material. Your lowest quiz grade will be dropped at the end of the semester.

<u>Two tests</u> will occur during the semester. The first test will cover Lesson 10 of *Al-Kitaab Vol 2*, and the second test will cover the material in our unit on media Arabic. We will have a review of the material before each test.

<u>Oral presentations</u> will be on topics pertinent to our recent course material and will be opportunities to evaluate students' speaking skills.

<u>In-class writing assignment:</u> Students will be asked to write spontaneously for a part of a class period on an assigned topic related to our course content.

<u>Essay</u>: toward the end of the semester, students will write an essay on a topic related to one of the topics covered in the course (Arab universities, Arabic media, or Arabic short stories).

Using online translation tools and asking Arabic speakers from outside our class to help complete writing and oral assignments for this course is not permitted and constitutes academic dishonesty.



ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

- 1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

- 2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
- 3. Other academic misconduct includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
- 4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
