### **COURSE OUTLINE**

#### DESCRIPTION

This course will focus on Arabic short stories from across the Arabic-speaking world. Study of these stories will reinforce and expand knowledge of Arabic vocabulary, grammar, culture, and literary styles. Reading, listening, writing, and speaking skills will also be further developed through reading, discussing, and writing about the short stories and their themes.

### **OBJECTIVES**

- Increasing students' abilities in listening, speaking, reading, and writing Modern Standard Arabic in its cultural contexts.
- Reinforcing and expanding students' understanding and production of Modern Standard Arabic vocabulary, grammar, and idiomatic expressions.
- Developing students' comprehension of Arabic literary prose, appreciation of stylistic features of short stories, and knowledge of Arab cultures through engaged reading of short stories.

### **OUTCOMES**

Students will improve their Modern Standard Arabic comprehension and production, aiming toward the advanced level of language proficiency. They will achieve higher levels of listening, speaking, reading, and writing as well as expand their knowledge of vocabulary, grammar, expressions, and Arab cultures. They will gain exposure to a variety of Arabic short stories, and through these readings, gain increased comprehension of Arabic literary prose, appreciation for stylistic features of these texts, and cultural knowledge.

### **COURSE NOTES**

### **ASSESSMENT**

Active class participation: 10%

Homework: 15%

Oral presentations (2): 15% Written assignments (4): 40% Audio recordings (5): 15%

Self-reflection: 5%

Extra credit: Optional; 0.25% per eligible activity, up to a maximum of 6 activities.

There will be <u>no</u> final exam in this course.

<u>Active class participation:</u> Class sessions are your primary venue for practicing and speaking Modern Standard Arabic, and speaking is one of the skills that this course develops. As such, regular participation is key to success in this course. Participation includes speaking up, volunteering to ask and answer questions, and following instructions. Participation will be assessed as follows:

A range: Volunteer to speak 3+ times per week B range: Volunteer to speak 1-2 times per week

C range: Speak only when asked

D range: Does not consistently speak when asked

<u>Homework:</u> Regular homework assignments will focus on vocabulary, grammar, and comprehension of meaning in the Arabic short stories we read. Homework is evaluated for completion, timeliness, and demonstrating understanding of the material.

<u>Oral presentations:</u> There will be two oral presentations during the semester. The first presentation will be on the author and/or historical context of a short story, and the second presentation will focus on an interpretation of, or commentary on, a short story.

<u>Written assignments:</u> Written assignments will be designed to provide practice writing in Modern Standard Arabic; using vocabulary, grammar, and expressions in creative ways; and developing and presenting ideas and commentaries on the short stories we read during the term. Assignments will be evaluated for the effectiveness of their communication of ideas in Arabic; accurate use of vocabulary, grammar, and expressions; and quality of ideas and insights on aspects of the short stories. A creative option will be provided for at least one of the written assignments.

<u>Audio recordings</u>: Students will practice reading short sections of the stories aloud with attention to intonation, smooth delivery, accuracy (especially of short vowel placement), and pronunciation. Audio recordings of these readings will be submitted to D2L dropboxes set up for this purpose. Goals of these recordings include dedicated practice in reading aloud and deepening engagement with specific parts of the short stories.

<u>Self reflection</u>: A self reflection at the beginning, mid-point, and end of the term will provide the opportunity to reflect on one's own Arabic learning experience and goals, with attention to challenges, areas of improvement, and observation of one's own Arabic comprehension (listening and reading) and production (speaking and writing).

<u>Extra credit:</u> Eligible activities will be announced via D2L during the semester. Eligible activities may include attending and/or facilitating Arabic conversation hour, attending guest lectures, and other activities that enhance and strengthen students' knowledge of Arabic language and/or Arab cultures.

#### **INTEGRITY AND CONDUCT**

- 1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

- 2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
- 3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
- 4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
