DESCRIPTION

Basic concepts of the Chinese National Language. Reading and writing of characters, essentials of grammar, basic vocabulary, and oral drills on normal speech patterns. This course is a continuation of CHIN 205 (Beginner's Chinese I).

OBJECTIVES

In these five lessons to be taught in the course, students will learn to use Chinese to answer a phone call and initiate a phone conversation, set up an appointment with a teacher on a phone, ask for a favor, and ask someone to return a call (L6); comment on one's studies of Chinese including learning Chinese vocabulary, characters, grammar, study habits and performances in classes and exams (L7); describe the routine of a student's life on campus, write a simple diary entry, write a letter in the proper format, express one's modesty in terms of one's foreign language ability, and invite friends to go on an outing (L8); speak about the color, size and price of a purchase, recognize Chinese currency, pay bills in cash or with a credit card, determine the proper change you should receive, ask for a different size and/or color of merchandise and exchange merchandise (L9); comment about several means of transportation, explain how to travel from one station to another, describe a traffic route, express your gratitude after receiving a personal favor, and offer New Year's wishes (L10).

OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to use Chinese to make appointments and conduct telephone conversations (L6), comment on one's studies and describe one's study habits as well as performances (L7), describe the routine of a student's daily life, write a diary and a letter (L8), talk about the colors, sizes and prices that will be used in shopping, recognize Chinese currency, talk about methods for paying bills (L9), ask for and give directions about popular means of transportation (L10).

COURSE NOTES

- Class time is MWRF 2:00-2:50PM. Tuesday sessions requires NO in-person class meeting; students will be given a few days' window to complete the listening assignment on D2L weekly.
- Regular attendance is strongly expected. No recorded lectures will be provided. It is the students' responsibility to inquire on all the information they missed during their absences.

ASSESSMENT



I. Oral Work (20%)

- Read aloud (5%) (notes not allowed)
- Students will be provided with an excerpt from the dialogues they learn in class. Their speaking skill will be assessed based on the accuracy and fluency of their speech.
- Group oral performance (7.5%) (notes allowed, but not recommended)
 - Two students form a group and prepare a 4-min dialogue together on an assigned topic.
 Their speaking skill will be assessed based on the content, accuracy, and fluency of their speech.
- Oral Exam: Interview (7.5%) (notes not allowed)
 - o Instructor will ask students altogether 5-7 questions in Chinese. Their speaking skill will be assessed based on the accuracy and fluency of their speech. Students are encouraged to elaborate on their answer to receive a higher mark.

II. Written Work (20%)

- Take-home composition (5%) (open-book assignments)
 - Students will write a 250-word composition on a given topic at home. Their writing skill will be assessed based on the content, grammar, use of vocabulary and aesthetics of handwriting.
- In-class composition (5%) (open-book assignments)
 - Students will write a 250-word composition on a given topic in class. Their writing skill will be assessed based on the content, grammar, use of vocabulary and aesthetics of handwriting.
- Workbook and character workbook assignments (5%) (open-book assignments)
 - Workbook and character workbook will be checked in class on the test day, but students are strongly encouraged to complete them before the review session. Completion grade only. Students will receive zero mark if they cannot show the workbooks in class.
- Lab assignments (5%) (listening exercise; available on D2L, open-book assignments)
 - This assessment is available on D2L beginning every Tuesday and students will be given a window until that Friday 11:59 p.m. to complete it. No time limit. Only 1 attempt is allowed.

III. Tests $(5 \times 8 = 40\%)$

- Five review tests one test for each lesson (closed-book, closed-notes)
 - Each test consists questions of listening comprehension, grammar, translation and reading comprehension.
 - o Test dates: L.6 (1/25); L.7 (2/8); L.8 (3/3); L.9 (3/22); L.10 (4/12).

IV. Quizzes $(1.5 \times 10 = 15\%)$

- Ten vocabulary quizzes one quiz for each lesson dialogue. (closed-book, closed-notes)
 - Each quiz consists of 10 questions, testing Mandarin pinyin and Chinese characters.
 - Quiz dates: VQ6.1 (1/16); VQ6.2 (1/20); VQ7.1 (1/30); VQ7.2 (2/3); VQ8.1 (2/16); VQ8.2(3/1); VQ9.1 (3/9); VQ9.2 (3/15); VQ10.1 (3/27); VQ10.2 (4/3)



V. Class participation (5%)

• Attendance (three unexcused absences are allowed throughout the semester, 1% deduction for each further absence)
