DESCRIPTION

Welcome to French 209! This is a 3-credit semester course for students who are beginners in French. Emphasis is placed on oral / aural communication, writing skills and strategies to read efficiently in French. In addition, students are introduced to French and francophone cultures through readings and exercises integrated with the materials used for language acquisition. This course aims at developing students' communicative competence in preparation for further study. It is based on the textbook *Entre Nous 1* and online activities posted on the *Espace virtuel*. In this course, we will cover units 1, 2, 3 and 4.

Note to students who are not true beginners: If your instructor or undergraduate advisor deems that your skills outpace those of the rest of the class and that you are at a higher active working level, you will be required to withdraw from the course and enroll in its continuation such as FREN 211 or 213. You must sign an agreement that states your beginner status, or your exact pre-requisites. It is an academic offense to misrepresent your prior experience with the language. Background checks may be conducted.

PREREQUISITES: None.

OBJECTIVES

Basic elements of the French language will be covered, including training in comprehension, speaking, reading, and writing of French.

OUTCOMES

Outcomes in language courses are usually measured in terms of five basic skills:

Listening: you will be able to ...

- understand audio and video material which accompanies the textbook as well as simple conversations.
- understand a variety of communicative situations presented in elementary but authentic French.

Speaking: you will be able to ...

- ask and answer simple questions using basic vocabulary concerning immediate surroundings.
- introduce yourself, talk about likes and dislikes, state your age, nationality, and profession, introduce your family, friends, and a celebrity, describe your city and neighborhood, describe your hobbies.
- pronounce sounds of French correctly, as well as recognize and imitate essential intonation and rhythmic patterns of the language.

Reading: you will be able to ...



- read authentic French texts (up to 300 words in length) containing vocabulary studied in class as well as a number of cognates.
- understand the main ideas in simple authentic material (brochures, blogs, excerpts from magazines and online articles).
- apply some reading strategies (identifying cognates, scanning, dealing with unfamiliar words, predicting, activating background knowledge).

Writing: you will be able to ...

- write simple texts (up to 200 words in length) and give information about yourself, your relatives and your friends, and to narrate events grounded in personal experience.
- write short compositions accurately using vocabulary, grammatical forms and structures introduced in the course, using the regular *-ER* verbs and some irregular verbs in present tense.

Culture: you will be able to ...

differentiate between some sociolinguistic and pragmatic aspects of the language in particular the
use of polite / familiar forms and basic formal / informal spoken and written speech patterns
appreciate the similarities and the differences between Francophone cultures and your own culture,
in terms of behaviour, attitudes and values in contexts such as the family, university studies, work,
leisure, food, and festivals.

COURSE NOTES

- 1. Students are expected to check the D2L page (d2l.ucalgary.ca) daily for announcements, homework, assignments, marks, and tentative schedule.
- 2. Students are expected to attend class regularly, participate actively, and speak French. Please come prepared to engage with your classmates and refrain from using your cell phone for purposes unrelated to the course content. Be on time for classes.
- 3. **Missed assessments without any prior notice will receive a grade of zero**. If a student communicates with the instructor and explains the circumstances around the absence, the percentage weight for the assessment will be transferred to another component of the course.
- 4. Lab will commence on the week of **Monday January 16, 2023**. Attendance is mandatory. An oral presentation will be required as an element of the laboratory work. The presentation will be done with a partner, but individual marks will be given for grammar, vocabulary, flow and pronunciation, content, and creativity. The weekly lab schedule, as well as topics, guidelines, and grading rubrics for the oral presentations can be found in D2L (see module "Labos").
- 5. Students are encouraged to meet the French Centre monitors regularly (Craigie Hall C301) to complete their oral activities. Monitors are available Monday to Friday, from 9.00 AM to 3.00 PM.
- 6. **Permission** should be obtained from the instructor before any lecture recording.

Notes:

- 1. **Compositions** (150-200 words) are written on a specific topic given by your instructor. The grading rubric will be discussed in class.
- 2. **Tests** will include listening and reading comprehension, as well as grammar/vocabulary questions. The format will mainly be multiple choice and short answer. **Tests are closed-book and will be completed handwritten in class**. There is no final exam.
- 3. **Online Quizzes.** There are four (4) online quizzes posted on D2L and available immediately. Each quiz corresponds to one of the 4 units covered during the semester (*Entre Nous 1* Units 1, 2, 3, and 4) and consists of 80 self-correcting questions. Use your book, answer all questions, and submit your quiz. Your grade will appear immediately, but you will not see your answers. If you want to see your quizzes, make an appointment with your instructor. To access the 4 quizzes, enter D2L FREN209, click on "Assessments" --- "Quizzes" ---- "Start Quiz".
- You are allowed **unlimited attempts** for all 4 quizzes before the submission due dates. Your highest grade will count.
- There is no time restriction to do the guizzes.
- You will respond to 80 questions randomly drawn.
- You may start the quiz, save all your responses, stop it, and resume it later.
- There are 3 kinds of questions: Fill in the Blanks, Multiple choice, and True/False.
- You will need to access the Espace Virtuel to complete the "Comprehension" questions.
- If your computer is not equipped with French accents and cedilla, you will be able to cut and paste them from the top of the quiz page.
- Precise spelling is required.
- You will see all questions on the same page.
- You may go back to any question and make changes until you submit your quiz.
 - You need to complete each quiz at the end of each unit (see the submission dates below):
 - **Quiz 1** is due on **Monday Jan 30, 2023** at 11:59 PM.
 - Quiz 2 is due on Wednesday Feb 15, 2023 at 11:59 PM.
 - Quiz 3 is due on Friday Mar 17, 2023 at 11:59 PM.
 - Quiz 4 is due on Wednesday Apr 12, 2023 at 11:59 PM.
- 4. **Lab Oral Presentation** will take place during the lab. You will do your oral presentation with a partner. Details will follow in lab (see module "Labos" in D2L).
- 5. **Regular attendance and active participation** are crucial. Chronic absences, any unexcused absences, and chronic late arrivals/early departures will be reflected in your grade. My standard policy on this is **to reduce your final earned grade in this category by 2-point steps for each unexcused absence, chronic late arrival/early departure. For example, if you earned an 88% (A-) in the course but have 4 unexcused absences throughout the semester,**



your final percentage could be lowered to 80% (B), up to 10%. You are allowed one unexcused absence.

6. Students will have to complete **3 Oral Activities** (one activity per month, sequentially) in the French Centre. Each of the 3 activities is worth 1% of your final mark. If you complete all 3 of them to a satisfactory standard, you will receive 5% in total. Details on each activity, due dates, and the sign-up link are available in D2L (see module "Activités orales – Centre français").
