DESCRIPTION

Welcome to French 211! This is a 3-credit semester course for students who come from French 209 or French 20 (or equivalent). Particular emphasis is placed on oral/aural communication, writing skills and strategies to read efficiently in French. In addition, students are introduced to French and francophone cultures through readings and exercises integrated with the materials used for language acquisition. Emphasis is on developing students' communicative competence in preparation for further study. The course is based on the textbook *Entre Nous 1* and online activities posted on the *Espace virtuel*. In this course, we will cover units 5, 6, 7 and 8.

PREREQUISITES: French 20, French 209 or consent of the Department.

Note: Not open to students with credit in French 30 or French 31 (or equivalent).

OBJECTIVES

At the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Talk about daily activities and hobbies, give opinions on things
- Describe physical appearance, body parts, clothes and accessories
- Talk about colours, seasons and weather
- Discover French and Francophone food and products, learn to order food in a restaurant
- Learn French irregular verbs faire, sortir, connaître, vouloir, pouvoir, devoir
- Talk about past events using the passé composé
- Give orders or suggestions using the imperative mode, the verb devoir, and the expression il faut
- Using conditional mode to express a request in a polite way
- Use three ways to ask questions
- Rephrase sentences or answer questions using les pronoms personnels COD

OUTCOMES

Outcomes in language courses are usually measured in terms of five basic skills:

Listening: you will be able to ...

- understand audio and video material which accompanies the textbook as well as simple conversations.
- understand a variety of communicative situations presented in elementary but authentic French.

Speaking: you will be able to ...

- ask and answer simple questions using basic vocabulary concerning immediate surroundings.



- talk about past and future events, compare people or situations, talk about familiar situations such as your weather, clothes, meals and health.
- pronounce sounds of French correctly, as well as recognize and imitate essential intonation and rhythmic patterns of the language.

Reading: you will be able to ...

- read authentic French texts (up to 300 words in length) containing vocabulary studied in class as well as cognates
- understand the main ideas in simple authentic material (brochures, advertisement, job postings)
- apply some reading strategies (identifying cognates, scanning, dealing with unfamiliar words, predicting, activating background knowledge).

Writing: you will be able to ...

- write simple texts (up to 250 words in length) and give information about yourself, your relatives and your friends, and to narrate events grounded in personal experience.
- write short compositions accurately using vocabulary, grammatical forms and structures introduced in the course, using the present tense, passé composé, future proche, imperative, and conditional.

Culture: you will be able to ...

- differentiate between some sociolinguistic and pragmatic aspects of the language in particular the use of polite / familiar forms and basic formal / informal spoken and written speech patterns
- appreciate the similarities and the differences between Francophone cultures and your own culture, in terms of behaviour, attitudes and values in contexts such as the family, university studies, work, leisure and food.

4. Guidelines for Zoom meetings:

- 1) All lecture and lab sessions will take place synchronously via Zoom. Zoom links will be posted on D2L. Lecture will not be recorded, but PPT handouts will be posted on D2L to assist your learning.
- 2) Since this is a language class, you may be asked to perform oral activities with or in front of your classmates. Please make sure your **microphone and camera are functionally normally**. It is highly recommended that you find a quiet space to attend each Zoom session.
- 3) Attendance: To derive the utmost benefit of instruction, daily attendance is essential. Attending class is extremely beneficial to understand the textbook content written purely in French, to hear and speak French, to interact with others and to receive instant feedback from your instructor and your peers. The instructor should be informed of any reason for prolonged absence.
- 4) Participation: You are expected to participate actively in the Zoom sessions. Please restrict yourself from using material or digital tools irrelevant to the course. Please mute your cellphone during class.
- 5) Classroom Etiquette: practicing a foreign language entails taking risks and allowing yourself to be vulnerable in front of other people. You are used to being able to speak at a much more sophisticated level in your native language, so working in French is not always easy. For this reason, it is essential to establish an atmosphere of mutual respect in the classroom. Please be attentive and listen not only to your instructor but also to your classmates when they speak.
- 5. Be on time for Zoom lectures: Tests, dictations and in-class composition usually start at the beginning of class and will not be repeated for latecomers.
- 6. Missing a test: A student who is absent from a test for legitimate reasons must discuss an alternative course of action with the instructor. The instructor at his or her own discretion may transfer the percentage weight for a test to another test.
- 7. Labs will start the week of **January 18-23rd, 2021**. As an integral part of this course, labs are mandatory and attendance will be taken. Oral participation in the labs will be assessed for consideration of the final grade. An oral presentation will be required as an element of the laboratory work. The topic and the rubrics of the oral presentation are posted on D2L. Please complete your assigned lab assignments prior to each lab session.
- 8. You are expected to check the D2L page on a regular basis for announcements, homework, assignments, marks and complementary learning materials.
- 9. You are advised to read the excerpt on PLAGIARISM.
- 10. How to enhance your French class?

- All assignments will be available for 24 hours or more.

- There is no mid-term or final exam, but all tests are cumulative.

ASSESSMENT (assignments and tests dates are posted in the "Tentative schedule" on D2L)

1) Dictations (2x5%=10%)

Dictations are spelling tests. Your instructor prepares a paragraph of ~100 words and reads it to you slowly so you can write every word and punctuation. There is no memorization necessary and there are no questions to answer at the end of the test. Dictations are designed to verify your understanding of sounds, words, phrases, grammar and syntax. When grading dictations, one mark is taken away for each of the following: spelling, verb agreement, adjective agreement, noun agreement, capital letters and all omissions. Half a mark for accents, hyphens, capital letters and punctuation. To prepare for dictations, listen to the unit vocabulary on the Espace virtuel website, read vocabulary aloud paying attention to accents and liaisons, spell each new noun with its article, and write down each verb with its conjugation. Each dictation is worth 5%.

2) Compositions (2x7.5%=15%)

Compositions are paragraph written on a specific topic given by your instructor. They can vary in length: 200 words to 250 words. Compositions are marked out of 100 points: 50 points are for content (respect of the given topic, appropriate length, creativity, avoidance of repetition, use of vocabulary seen in class) and 50 points are for proper language use (varied vocabulary, tenses, conjugations, punctuation, agreements, sentence structure, spelling, prepositions and avoidance of anglicisms).

3) Tests (Test 1: 20%, Test 2: 10%)

Tests are based on unit material and are divided into several sections. They may include listening comprehension, reading comprehension, composition, grammar questions, vocabulary questions, transformations... Each section is presented with detailed instructions as well as the mark value. A few days before each test, your Instructor will post the format of the test on D2L.



4) Online Quizzes

There are four (4) online open-book quizzes posted on D2L and available immediately and until **Friday April 16th 2020, 11:55PM**. Each quiz corresponds to one unit and consists of 80 self-correcting questions. Your grade will immediately appear upon submission, but you will not see your answers. To discuss your quizzes performance, please meet your Instructor during her office hours. To access the 4 D2L quizzes, click on "Assessments" - "Quizzes" - "Start Quiz".

You are allowed unlimited attempts for all 4 quizzes.

Your highest grade will count.

There is no time restriction to do the quizzes.

You will respond to 80 questions randomly drawn.

You may start the guiz, save all your responses, stop it and resume it later.

There are 3 kinds of questions: Fill in the Blanks, Multiple choice, and True/False.

You will need to access the Espace Virtuel to complete the "Comprehension" questions.

If your computer is not equipped with French accents and cedilla, you will be able to cut and paste them from the top of the quiz page.

Precise spelling is required.

You will see all questions on the same page.

You may go back to any question and make changes until you submit your quiz.

For your participation mark, you need to **complete each quiz at the end of each unit**, with a grade of **above 60%**. Due dates are posted in the "tentative schedule" on D2L.

All 4 quizzes may be redone until Friday April 16th, 2020, 11:55PM.

5) Lab Oral presentation (5%)

- Oral presentations take place in the lab. They are designed to give you a chance to practice French orally. Topics are posted on D2L with the marking rubrics.
- Please make sure that your microphone and camera are both on for this assignment. You will do your oral presentation with a partner, but individual marks will be granted. No reading is allowed. Only index cards with key words may be used. A penalty of -25% will apply to all oral presentations read to the audience. To ensure that you are not reading your script, you will be asked to perform the presentation at least one metre away from your screen/camera.
- The oral presentation is worth 5%. Please choose a date and a topic for your oral presentation by **January 31**st, **2021.**
- If you experience speech anxiety, you may choose to submit your presentation in the recorded video form, same criteria mentioned above will be applied. Please talk to both your lecture and lab instructors by **January 31**st, **2021** for this arrangement.

6) Active participation (10%)

Attendance and active participation in lab and class are crucial. You need to come prepared for class and exercises must be done in advance. Grading rubrics are posted on D2L.

7) Oral activities

There are **5** oral activities to be completed with the French centre monitors via Zoom.

- Zoom link will be available on D2L;
- You may book your individual meeting for any time from Monday to Friday, 10.00AM-12.00PM and 1.00PM-3.00PM, using the following hyperlink <u>Sign up Sheet</u>
- If you need to cancel or change your appointment (preferably 24 hours before your sign-up time), you will be able to do it directly on the booking webpage.
- Please make sure to **turn on your camera and microphone** for all the activities.
- Each activity is approximately 5 minutes' long;
- You may do the activities in any order;
- One activity per appointment; One activity per week;
- The due date for the five activities is Thursday April 15th, 2021.



Activities:

Options of reading, oral activity 1 and communication activities are listed under D2L Content - "Activités orales".

- Free activity

Each week, the French Centre monitors will offer a 30-minutes oral practice via Zoom. You are expected to attend at least one of them.

Reading

Prepare a 2-minute reading from the textbook and read it to the monitor.

- Oral activity 1

With a partner from your class or your lab, choose **ONE** dialogue from the textbook. Memorize it and perform it to a monitor. Alternatively, you may choose to memorize a French poem or sing a French song, for any of these alternative choices, please have it approved by your instructor.

- Oral activity 2

This is a rehearsal of your lab oral presentation. Memorize your script and perform it with your lab presentation partner to the monitor.

Communication

Choose 4 questions, prepare, memorize your answers, and present them to the monitor.

- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do



so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
