DESCRIPTION : Ce cours est construit autour de l'œuvre du cinéaste Denis Arcand comme important représentant du cinéma québécois après 1980. Par le biais de ses films québécois et canadiens, on saisira les principales thématiques mise en jeu dans ce cinéma national : identités, société, mythes, discours, critique politique et sociale.

La plupart des films comportent des scènes de sexualité et d'homosexualité, et présentent des remises en question religieuses, politiques et sociales que d'aucuns pourraient trouver choquantes.

- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.
