DESCRIPTION

Le cours vise à montrer de quelle manière les œuvres littéraires s'inscrivent dans l'histoire sociale, culturelle et politique de leur siècle. Il offre des détails importants sur l'évolution de la littérature, les grandes figures qui ont marqué cette évolution, les grands débats et les courants importants qui ont enrichi le progrès de la littérature française et par la suite francophone par rapport aux connaissances humaines à travers le temps. On abordera les œuvres, les auteurs, les problématiques importantes dans une analyse chronologiques allant du Moyen-âge au XXème siècle.

I - Objectifs

Le cours vise quatre objectifs majeurs

- 1- Initier les étudiants au contexte de civilisation et de progrès social, culturel, intellectuel dans lequel s'est formée et continue de se conformer la littérature française et les littératures dites émergentes des espaces francophones
- 2- Familiariser les étudiants à des techniques de synthèse qui leur permettent de développer des qualités d'analyse et de reconstruction plutôt que le réflexe de la mémorisation, à travers l'étude de quelques morceaux choisis, des figures les plus marquantes de l'histoire littéraire.
- 3- Conduire l'étude de l'histoire de la littérature de manière à favoriser le perfectionnement de la langue française
- 4- Développer le goût de la lecture avec la présentation des différentes variétés d'écriture qu'offrent les siècles : contes et fables, récits mythologiques et religieux, textes documentaires, pamphlets, romans, théâtres, poésie, littérature pour la jeunesse, manifestes, etc.

II - Déroulements du cours

Chaque siècle fera l'objet d'une présentation méthodique, avec les événements importants, les œuvres et les écrivains qui l'incarnent, les grandes problématiques qu'on y recense, les anecdotes ou les querelles littéraires qu'il a connues.

Une phase pratique centrée sur l'implication de l'étudiant dans l'approfondissement de ses propres connaissances : recherches à la bibliothèque, sur le net des éléments relatifs aux divers aspects abordés au cours. Ces éléments feront l'objet de présentations orales en petits groupes pour une meilleure connaissance et pratique de la langue.

PREREQUISITE:

French 215 et 217, ou autorisation du Département.

MODALITÉS D'ÉVALUATION

1. Travaux de recherche en groupes (présentations orales)	20%
2. Comptes-rendus individuels des travaux de recherche en groupes (3 pages)	20%
3. Contrôles en classe (2 X 15%)	30%
4. Travail final de synthèse (5 pages)	30%

Le compte-rendu individuel reprendra, de manière critique, le travail de recherche en groupe. Le travail final de synthèse devra exploiter au maximum les textes constituant le manuel de cours.

Présentation des deux travaux écrits : Times new Roman 12, Interligne 1,5 ; marges : 2,5cm

Les travaux écrits devront être soumis sur papier et ne pourront être soumis électroniquement qu'exceptionnellement et après discussion avec le professeur.

COURSE NOTES

Format du cours : Le cours consistera en une combinaison de cours magistraux, de discussions, de travaux de recherche en groupe et de présentations en classe par des équipes d'étudiant(e)s, et de travaux individuels.

La boîte aux documents du département, située dans le hall d'entrée du troisième étage de Craigie Hall, entre les blocs D et C, est mise à la disposition des étudiants pour y déposer les devoirs et travaux requis pour leurs cours. Le matériel placé dans la boîte sera ramassé en début et en fin de journée (jours ouvrables) et sera timbré à date.

Late assignments and missed tests policy: No late assignments will be accepted unless prior arrangements have been made with the professor and valid justification has been provided (medical certificate, tsunami, earthquake, etc.). This course includes regular in-class tests. Students will not be able to write missed tests at other dates and times than the prescribed set dates and times unless request is made in writing and valid justification is provided.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

- Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
 - the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
 - parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;

- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted." Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. Cheating at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. Other academic misconduct includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
