DESCRIPTION

Depuis que les écrivains parlent d'écrire, les mêmes questions reviennent tout le temps ; les mêmes réponses aussi. Parmi celles-ci figure le rapport à la langue. Ce cours va réaffirmer le lien étroit et dialectique entre littérature et linguistique, comme deux paradigmes d'une même réalité : le langage. Nous étudierons des textes de certains théoriciens qui, depuis Saussure, ont postulé ce lien (Bally, Bakhtine, Barthes, Benveniste, Genette, Jakobson, Maingueneau, Meschonnic, Weinrich...). L'objectif final sera de découvrir ensemble comment s'illustrent les phénomènes langagiers dans la création littéraire.

OBJECTIVES

A l'issue de ce cours, les étudiants verront très clairement le lien qui existe entre la linguistique et la littérature; ainsi que la nature dudit lien.

Ils auront également lu, dans le texte, des théoriciens clés qui permettent d'asseoir cette perspective. Bref, le cours offre la base linguistique théorique indispensable pour l'analyse des textes littéraires.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
 - a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
 - b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
 - c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
 - d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted." Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. Cheating at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. Other academic misconduct includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.

	Scores	Criteria for Vocabulary	Criteria for Grammar
EXCELLENT	10-9	Language choices appropriate for topic, excellent use of idioms and precise vocabulary; no evidence of English interference. No spelling mistakes.	Wide range of structures with few significant errors
GOOD	8-7	Language choices usually appropriate for topic: vocabulary accurate but limited; some errors of interference may be present but meaning rarely obscured. A few spelling mistakes.	Adequate range of structures, but little variety; tends to overuse simple structures; some significant and minor errors (e.g. agreement) but meaning seldom obscured.
FAIR	6-5	Language choices sometimes inappropriate for topic; vocabulary very limited, with overuse of imprecise or vague terms; English interference evident; meaning confused or obscured. Some spelling mistakes present.
