DESCRIPTION DU COURS

Privilégiant les relations entre le roman moderne et les autres arts (surtout la musique, le film et la peinture), ce cours a pour but de proposer une réflexion sur le travail esthétique du lecteur réel qui se promène dans le texte écrit. Nous explorerons la façon dont la littérature moderne cherche à intégrer certains modes de signification appartenant plus proprement à d'autres arts. Nous insisterons beaucoup sur la participation active de chacun(e) des étudiant(e)s.

OBJECTIFS

Nous cherchons à développer une appréciation approfondie de la relation intense entre la littérature et les autres arts. Nous allons privilégier la littérature plus ou moins contemporaine.

COURS PRÉALABLES

Trois demi-cours de français de niveau 400, ou autorisation du Département.

DEVOIRS ET ÉVALUATION

- travail préliminaire = 16% de la note finale
- résumés écrits concernant la séance précédente (4 x 6% - chaque résumé comportera au moins 500 mots – Une partie de la note attribuée à chaque résumé (15%) sera réservée à la grammaire et à l'orthographe) TOTAL pour les résumé = 24% de la note finale
- participation active en classe (ce qui comprendra, entre autres, des résumés oraux des séances précédentes) = 16% de la note finale
- la présentation orale (à la toute fin du cours) concernera le livre de Bergez = 14% de la note finale
- le travail écrit final (à peu près quatorze pages dactylographiées, y compris les notes et la bibliographie) concernera le livre d'Hubert Aquin = 30% de la note finale

Il n'y aura pas d'examen final.

1. Une note passable pour la participation presuppose une bonne relecture des textes **AVANT que nous commençons à en parler ensemble**. Elle presuppose aussi une bonne préparation de questions, lesquelles vous tâcherez de poser en classe. Prenez des notes pendant chaque séance et soyez prêts à fournir des détails, prélevés de vos notes, au début des séances de mercredi, jeudi et vendredi et samedi.
2. Lisez, relisez et re-relisez
3. Veuillez prendre note des règlements de l'Université concernant le plagiat (verso)
4. Les travaux non complétés à temps, les tests et examens non écrits aux jours prévus sans raison valable, recevront un F. Il n'y aura pas de travaux de rattapage. **Je ne peux pas accepter les travaux remis en retard.**
5. Travaux remis électroniquement: je les encourage mais seulement en documents Word.
6. ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:

- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.

DISABILITIES AND ACADEMIC ACCOMMODATION

It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodations.
