DESCRIPTION

The 19th Century French realist novel, from its first manifestations under the pen of Mme de Staël or Chateaubriand, to the analytical yet romantic form of realism created by Balzac, to the socially critical realism proposed by mid-century novelists and painters, Hugo, Maupassant, Courbet, among others, to the scientifically inclined version of realism that crystallized around Zola's naturalism, shows the constant struggle between the new tenants of political and economic power — the politician, the banker, the captain of industry, the nobleman — and those living in the fringes of society in post-revolutionary France —, the servant, the child, the worker, the homeless, the immigrant. This course will examine both the mechanisms of social marginalization in 19th Century France and its multiple representations in literary prose.

OBJECTIVES

Ce cours voudra enseigner aux étudiants.es à :

- Développer et à confirmer leurs aptitudes pour la recherche en littérature ;
- Organiser et à planifier un travail de recherche ;
- Réfléchir aux mécanismes qui attachent les enjeux esthétiques aux questions politiques et sociales dans le contexte historique du 19^e siècle français ;
- Mesurer l'évolution d'un mouvement esthétique, en l'occurrence le réalisme ;
- Développer leur esprit de synthèse;
- Développer leur esprit critique;
- Améliorer leur expression orale et écrite en français.

OUTCOMES

Au sortir de ce cours, l'étudiant.e aura élargi sa compréhension historique du siècle numéro 19, saura distinguer certains aspects importants qui caractérisent l'évolution de la prose romanesque française entre la période postrévolutionnaire et les débuts de la 3^e République et sera préparé à entreprendre une réflexion plus longue et plus approfondie qui se ferait au sein d'un programme de Honours ou de Maîtrise.

COURSE NOTES

1. All pedagogical activities will be delivered in a synchronous mode, via Zoom / D2L during the scheduled course hours, Tu/Th from 12:30 to 13:45 am.
2. Five (5) of the six (6) assessments will be done during class time. Please see next section for exact dates. The last one, the final paper, will be done at home during the student's own time.

4. Guidelines for submitting assignments: the scheduled writing assignment, the final paper, will be submitted in a designated Dropbox on the course's D2L site. Please see **Assessment** section here below.
5. 6. Attendance and participation: attendance at ALL on-line classes and assignments is expected.
7. Online "Zoom" Class Etiquette: A) on your Zoom screen/profile, please use your real name and the name by which you would like to be addressed by the prof and by others during class; you may add your preferred pronouns in brackets if you wish and a pronunciation helper if you deem it necessary. B) Be mindful of your "on-camera" space; you may curate that space in advance and organize the setting/decor that will be made visible on camera; you may also chose to use a virtual backdrop if you do not wish your living space to be visible to others. C) Avoid distraction while online: for instance, before class, clear the



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room of playful pets, try to minimize background noise by turning off the TV and radio, and, please, also turn off and set aside your cell phone just like you would if you were sitting in a real classroom. D) Dress shirt or sweater? you may obviously dress as you see fit, but, if I may gently put forward a general advice: resist the temptation of adopting an overly casual dress code during online Zoom classes. E) Lastly, once you've logged in, refrain from turning off your camera: no prof likes to talk to a virtual classroom only populated by anonymous and opaque dark squares. Stay present, stay engaged. Regarding etiquette, the key word is: professional. Adopt a professional and courteous behavior in all your interactions with your peers and with the prof.

8. Email etiquette: Follow proper etiquette when you write an email to your prof. First: always open with a greeting and address the person by his/her proper professional title ("Dear Professor...", "Hello Professor XYZ...", In French, simply write "Bonjour Monsieur XYZ"). Secondly: state your question clearly and concisely. Thirdly: always close politely ("Thank you...", "Best regards", In French: "Cordialement", or "Merci", etc.). And always sign with your full name (not just your first name, or nick name or unsigned anonymous email).
9. Media policy in case of recording: online synchronous courses, assessments and other pedagogical activities delivered in this online course will not be recorded by the instructor; should a need arise to record a class or an activity, participants will be informed in advance and given the opportunity to adjust their technological settings to suit their choice.

Academic misconduct

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:

a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another



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impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);

b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;

c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or

d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
