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**DESCRIPTION**

Représentations de la femme îlienne dans la littérature des Mascareignes et des Antilles.

Nous examinerons les représentations de la femme dans la littérature des Mascareignes et des Antilles pour élucider les questions sociales, culturelles et identitaires en milieu îlien postcolonial. Le masque, la folie, la préservation de la mémoire collective – tels sont quelques éléments qui engageront notre réflexion. Nous nous pencherons sur les théories féministes, postcoloniales et discursives pour entendre la voix – ou mesurer le silence – des femmes dans les textes fictionnels postcoloniaux.

- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.
