

GERM 501 Advanced German Fall 2018

COURSE OUTLINE

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DESCRIPTION

This advanced German language course focuses on the improvement of all four language skills (reading, writing, speaking, and listening) through the creative engagement with one of Germany's foremost writers and theater practitioners, Bertolt Brecht (1898-1956). This course places great emphasis on peer learning.

OBJECTIVES

- Students will improve their German oral and written comprehension skills as well as their ability to speak and write in German.
- Students will strengthen their abilities to improve their work in collaboration with peers.
- Students will improve their ability to reflect on the principles guiding their work and to make them transparent to their audience.
- Students will familiarize themselves with the life and work of one of the most important German playwrights, Bertolt Brecht.

OUTCOMES

- Students will be able to extract important information from complex German texts and films of different genres.
- Students will be able to summarize a text (or film), to describe its formal and stylistic features, and to comment on it in German (orally and in written form).
- When writing an essay, students will be able to tie their arguments to written sources in a transparent and convincing manner.
- When translating a text, students will know how to formulate principles guiding their work.
- Students will be able to develop effective oral presentations based on their written work.
- Students will know how to communicate productive feedback on written work presented by their peers.
- Seeing a theater production or watching a film, students will be able to identify elements of Brechtian aesthetics and their effects.

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COURSE NOTES

Essays (40% = 5 x 8 % of final grade): Students write 5 short essays. Essays will be graded based on completion of the task (2% each), structure (introduction and conclusion, clear transitions) (2% each), vocabulary (appropriate register, variety, and correct usage) (2% each) and grammatical structures (variety and correctness) (2% each).

Presentations (24% = 4 x 6% of final grade): Students present on four occasions. Students' performances will be graded based on completion of the task (3% each), vocabulary (appropriate register, variety, and correct usage) (1% each), grammatical structures (variety and correctness) (1% each), and interaction with students and instructor (1% each).

Homework (15 % = 15 x 1% of final grade): Homework has to be presented in class on the day for which it was assigned. Up to 5 assignments can be handed in late (within one week of the day on which it was assigned). Homework has to be complete, but it does not have to be correct to earn full credit.

Quizzes (21 % = $3 \times 7\%$ of final grade): The three quizzes test students' grasp of vocabulary and cultural knowledge acquired in class. Terms and facts covered on the quizzes will be made available in class throughout the semester.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

- 1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever;



bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

- 3. Other academic misconduct includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
- 4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
