COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will begin by revisiting and reviewing some of the language structure topics covered in INDL 301-Blackfoot Language, to solidify the students' knowledge and proficiency in Blackfoot. We will then continue by introducing various topics utilizing the four basic linguistic skills: writing, speaking, listening, and reading. Attention will be given to extended conversation practice, in-class discussions, and through presentations. A key component of this course will be an increasing engagement with Blackfoot language and culture through stories, and videos.

OBJECTIVES

- To review grammatical structures learned in INDL 301-Blackfoot Language course
- To refine pronunciation
- To engage in beginner level Blackfoot language dialogue
- To gain competency with both digital and written resources for language learning
- To learn the importance of storytelling and its significance to the Blackfoot people

OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will have skills in basic conversational Blackfoot, will demonstrate an understanding of the grammar of this language, and will have competency with using written and digital resources for learning Blackfoot. Students will also receive cultural lessons, further immersing them in the society where this language is spoken today, leading to cross-cultural competencies and respect for Blackfoot culture and heritage.

ASSESSMENT

Policy for missed or late assignments:

Late assignments will be assessed -5% per day (including weekends) if there has been no prior notice or discussion with the instructor. All in-class quizzes will take place at the beginning of classes. Make-up quizzes will not be permitted. Students will receive a grade of zero for any quiz that is not completed on the designated date.

PARTICIPATION: The best way to learn a language is to speak the language. In-class activities are designed to give you a chance to practice speaking in the Blackfoot language. Participating in class discussions and practice activities will earn students up to 20% of their final grade.

HOMEWORK: Students will receive worksheets throughout the course which they will take home to complete and return to instructor for evaluation. Completing the worksheets on a regular basis will earn students up to 20% of their final grade.

DISCUSSION LEADER: Each student is responsible for leading one (1) class discussion. The discussion leader will prepare an activity to share with the class that is based on words/phrases learned. If the student comes to class prepared and completes the exercise, it is worth up to 20% of their final grade.

QUIZZES: There are (4) scheduled quizzes, which test students on the material covered in the previous classes. Quizzes are worth 20% of the overall final grade, 5% from each of the four quizzes. A student who is absent from a quiz for legitimate reasons must discuss an alternative course of action with the instructor. The instructor at her own discretion may transfer weight for a quiz to another quiz. The instructor will make this decision on the basis of verbal information provided by the student or require the evidence.

FINAL PRESENTATION: During the final week of the semester, students will give a short group presentation. This presentation will be done with a partner, but individual marks will be granted. Students will be assessed on presentation, pronunciation, grammar, and creativity. Further details will be provided in person. The final presentation is worth 20% of the final grade

If you experience speech anxiety, you may choose to submit your presentation in a video form. The same criteria mentioned above will be applied. Please speak to instructor as early in the semester as possible about this consideration.
