DESCRIPTION

JPNS301:Continuing Japanese I (the first semester in "Continuing Japanese") is the second year of our Japanese program and continuation of JPNS207. Textbook Genki II Lesson 13-17 (both Conversation & Grammar and Reading & Writing) will be covered. Students will comprehensively build communication competencies across all four skill areas-listening, speaking, reading, and writing. Emphasis has been placed on balancing accuracy, fluency, and complexity.

[Prerequisites] Japanese 207 or consent of the School

[Note] All university level prerequisites for Japanese language courses must be met with a grade of "C-" or higher.

OBJECTIVES

The main objective of this course is to build up four basic skills in Japanese: listening, speaking, reading and writing.

OUTCOMES

At the completion of this course, you will be able to 1) demonstrate correct usage of basic and intermediate grammar, including potential and volitional forms of verbs, noun modifications, conditionals and some conjectures; 2) comprehend conversations on familiar topics spoken in a natural speed; 3) read and write 79 new kanji; and 4) write coherent paragraphs.

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[General Course Information]

- Lectures are delivered in-person on Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 11:00-11:50am for this course. These lectures will give students opportunities to have further understanding of the new materials, practice new grammar points and review grammar points from previous lecture by speaking and listening to the instructor as well as interacting with other students.
- Labs are scheduled on Tuesdays for this course. Students must access the tasks online at 11:00-11:50am and complete them before the due. Online portions of the unit tests will be assigned during the lab, as well.
- Your university email will be used to correspond in this course, so you must check it regularly.
- D2L will be used to distribute all course materials and information. It is the students' responsibility to check all course related information on D2L and complete all the tasks in time.

[Participation]

- This course is in-person course and students must attend the lectures.
- "Participation" here includes regular attendance, active participation during the lecture, and preparation for the coming lectures including homework and daily practice. These (regular attendance, active participation, and preparation) are essential to maximize one's language learning and complete this course successfully.
- During the lectures, students are expected to make voluntary remarks/responses and actively participate in the pair/group work.
- Participation (5%) will be evaluated by the instructor based on the instructor's observation during the class and student's self-reflection.

[Policy in case of missed or late for any graded coursework]

- When you are missing or can't complete any graded coursework such as tests and assignments in time with a legitimate reason, you must communicate with your course instructor PRIOR to the event or the deadline. Failing to do that will result in no make-up or extension (=a grade of 0).
- When you need to submit your coursework after the original due date, 1. ask your instructor by email to re-open the submission file such as Dropbox since it might be closed after the original due date, and 2. Let your instructor know by email that you submitted your work so that your instructor don't miss marking it.
- When you can't submit your coursework on time during class due to your absence, you must submit your work electronically (via D2L Dropbox, email...etc.) before the deadline. Failing to do that will result in late submission with deduction in the grade or a grade of 0.

[Guidelines for tests/quizzes/assignments]

Unit Tests

There are 2 unit tests and these are CLOSED textbook. Each Test consists of 2 sections (A & B); A online section(Listening/Grammar focused) and B in-class section(Reading comp./Kanji/Sentence writing focused). The online section of the tests will be scheduled on Tuesday(Lab) via D2L quiz. These tests are open for a regular test length + an additional 50% extension (Ex.30min. + 15min.=45min.) to allow for any technology issues that may arise. You have only ONE attempt, and once you start a test, you must complete it within a fixed time limit. However, you can choose when to start your test within 12-hour access window(10am-10pm). The in-class section of the tests are 50-min. length and will be completed in-class during the regular lecture hours. For all the unit tests, extensions of the accessing time(online test only) and make-ups are NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth.



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Oral/Speaking Test

Oral/Speaking test is a solo(/pair) interview-style test and will be scheduled mainly during the class by appointments. More details will be provided later in the course. Make-ups and alternative date/time are NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth.

Quizzes

These quizzes are CLOSED textbook via D2L quiz. Once you start a quiz, you must complete it within a short, fixed time limit. However, you have an UNLIMITED number of attempts before the due date. The questions will be shuffled and switched each time you attempt, and you must repeat each quiz 5 TIMES minimum even if you score 100% for the first time for your better understanding. Make-ups and extensions of the accessing time are NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth.

Projects

These 2 projects are take-home projects and have three main components (writing assignments/ presentations/ peer reflections). All these tasks must be handed in by the deadline in-person or via D2L or other type of tools such as Jamboard. The extension of the deadlines is NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth. Late submissions will be accepted for only writing assignments and presentations up to 5 days and subjected to a 10% deduction per day. No submission will be accepted if more than 5 days have past and will result in a grade of zero, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth.

Other course tasks (Including Lab tasks and Homework)

In-class Self-introduction will be performed live and evaluated in class. Make-up and alternative date of performance are NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth.

Reading Recording will be submitted by the deadline via D2L. The extension of the deadlines is NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth. Late submissions will be accepted up to 3 days and subjected to a 50% deduction. No submission will be accepted if more than 3 days have past and will result in a grade of zero, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth.

The quiz tasks here (5 Grammar Quizzes) are delivered via D2L quiz. Once you start a quiz, you must complete it within a short, fixed time limit. However, you have an UNLIMITED number of attempts within 24-hour (or longer) access window. Use of textbook during these quizzes are permitted. Make-ups and extensions of the accessing time are NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth.

All other course tasks here (5 Reading & Writing practice, 5 Dictation/Listening practice, and 2 Self-reflection Log entries) will be graded on a pass/fail basis and must be handed in by the deadline in-person, via D2L or other type of tools such as Jamboard. The extension of the deadlines is NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth.

[Course expectations]

- It is YOUR responsibility to check the class schedule and all the information on D2L frequently so as not to miss any upcoming coursework.
- It is YOUR responsibility to read well and follow the coursework instructions provided on D2L. Submissions without following instructions fully will result in a grade of zero or some deduction.
- It is YOUR responsibility to keep up with what you have missed during the class (including assignments) from your own absence.



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- On top of 3-hour lecture time per week, 60-90 minutes daily self-study is required to follow this course successfully. Further time commitment may be required to complete projects and assignments.
- You are required to learn new vocabulary prior to each lesson and the targeted grammar points prior to each class.
- You are required to keep practicing *kana*, *Kanji* and new vocabulary on a daily basis.
- You are strongly recommended to use the audio study aid that comes with the textbook/workbook when you self-study. Other study aid materials will be provided in D2L.
- You are strongly encouraged to monitor your learning process in D2L. Self-reflection task might be assigned to improve student's learning experience.
