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## **COURSE DESCRIPTION & OBJECTIVES**

In this course we look at a wide range of manga (print comics), anime (animation), and videogames from Japan. We critically analyze these "texts" and question the extent to which these various genres and narratives are representative of "Japanese culture," and the influence they have had on it. Manga, anime, and games have related but distinct histories. Thus, a central focus of this course will be on examining the similarities and differences between these forms at the level of "media." We will consider what makes each of these forms unique and how stories can be adapted and told differently utilizing each platform. Drawing on assigned readings, we use a number of analytical perspectives in the course, including, but not limited to, literary studies, media studies, and history.

## **LEARNING OUTCOMES**

By the end of the course students will have:

- Gained knowledge of important events, issues, and themes in the cultural history of modern Japan
- Understood the development histories and construction of three forms of Japanese visual culture
- Read about and critically evaluated the aesthetics, narratives, and unique media characteristics of a wide variety of manga, anime, and videogames
- Gained experience in both the creative processes involved in making these media and the analytical thinking needed for writing about these works within a scholarly context

## WARNING(!)

One salient aspect of many genres of manga and anime is open representation of violence, sex, and sexuality. Consequently, in some classes we will be discussing and looking at potentially disturbing materials in order to understand their cultural significance. If you will be too uncomfortable to read/view materials or take part in these discussions, you should not take this course. (If you are under 18, you must receive permission from the instructor to take this course)

### ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

- 1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
  - b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
  - c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.



- 3. Other academic misconduct includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the nonauthorized tape recording of lectures.
- 4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
