DESCRIPTION

This advanced conversational Japanese course develops students' communication and conversation skills intensively through discussion of selected topics using a variety of authentic media and other resources. The course focuses on developing conversational abilities and vocabulary. In addition, through participating in various activities, students will develop ease with the language's cadence and pronunciation and also will acquire a deeper understanding of the cultural dynamics in spoken Japanese at the advanced level. Groups and/or individual students will make presentations to the class and also lead the class discussions in Japanese on various topics. The class also will expand students' ability to converse and read at different levels of formality in Japanese, while also exposing them to current events and cultural themes in Japan.

[Prerequisites] Japanese 331 or consent of the School

[Note] All university level prerequisites for Japanese language courses must be met with a grade of "C-" or higher.

OBJECTIVES

The main objective of this course is to develops students' listening/speaking and communication skills further through a various form of activities such as conversations, discussions, presentations, interviews, and video makings.

OUTCOMES

At the completion of this course, students will be able to 1) expand their vocabulary and knowledge of structural patterns of the language; 2) develop the ability to communicate in more complicated situations and social and cultural contexts, through speeches, skits, oral interviews, presenting personal opinions on current events etc.; 3) develop a greater comfort with the spoken language and fluency at advanced level.

Tests

There will be 2 solo oral/speaking tests to evaluate your achievement on what you have learned from language activities provided based on the textbook. They will be scheduled during the class. More details will be provided later in the course. Make-ups and alternative date/time are NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth.

Class Activities

5 class activity tasks will be assigned. Some are required to work solo, in pairs or groups. More details will be provided later in the course. <u>Make-ups, extension and alternative date/time are NOT allowed</u>, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth.

Project

This is a take-home project and you will have a live presentation of your final product in class. After the presentation, you must submit the video recording of your in-class live presentation via D2L by the deadline for evaluation. The extension of the deadlines is NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth. Late presentation will be accepted until the last day of the course and subjected to a 50% deduction. (However, it will result in a disqualification in participating in the peer-feedback.) For peer-feedback, late submissions will NOT be accepted. You will also receive a grade of zero in peer-feedback when you are late for video link sharing deadline.



Assignments

6 Lesson Quizzes

There quizzes are based on the 6 lessons in the textbook and delivered via D2L quiz. Once you start a quiz, you must complete it within a short, fixed time limit. However, you have an <u>UNLIMITED number of attempts</u> within 24-hour (or longer) access window. Use of textbook during these quizzes are permitted. <u>Make-ups and extensions of the accessing time are NOT allowed</u>, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth.

PR Video Challenge

You will create a PR(promotion) video of something/somewhere at the University of Calgary or in Calgary. You will submit your video via D2L by the deadline and present the video in class. The extension of the deadlines is NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth. Late submissions will be accepted up to 5 days and subjected to a 10% deduction per every 24 hours. (However, it will result in a disqualification in participating in the voting.) After the submission, you will be assigned to watch your peers' videos and submit your voting paper in class on the due date. late submissions will NOT be accepted for the voting paper. You will also receive a grade of zero in voting when you are late for video link sharing deadline.

News Video

You will choose one news article from "News Web Easy", listen to/ read the article, practice well until you can read the news like a newscaster. Then, record the news and submit the video via D2L by the deadline. The extension of the deadlines is NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth. Late submissions will be accepted up to 5 days and subjected to a 10% deduction per every 24 hours. (However, it will result in a disqualification in participating in the peerfeedback.) For peer-feedback, late submissions will NOT be accepted. You will also receive a grade of zero in peer-feedback when you are late for video link sharing deadline.

Self-reflection Log

You will be assigned to complete two self-reflection logs in this course and submit them in person and via D2L and by the deadline. <u>The extension of the deadlines is NOT allowed</u>, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth. <u>Late submissions will be accepted up to 3 days</u> and subjected to a 50% deduction.

[Course expectations]

- It is YOUR responsibility to check the class schedule and all the information on D2L frequently so as not to miss any upcoming coursework.
- It is YOUR responsibility to read well and follow the coursework instructions provided on D2L. Submissions without following instructions fully will result in a grade of zero or some deduction.
