Weekly reflections - 26%. (13 @ 2% each)

- Thirteen weekly reflections will be completed on D2L; the reflections are expected to be completed prior to the start of the following lecture (e.g., the reflection for the January 11th lecture must be submitted prior to 3:00 PM on January 18th). Late reflections will count for half marks if they are late by up to 7 days, and then will not be counted after that time.
- Content is expected to be thoughtful and reflect the learning of that week's content. This can generally include lecture content, textbook content, and/or additional discussion as appropriate. Some weekly reflections may be guided to certain topics or activities as discussed in lectures.
- Students are expected to complete one comment initiating a conversation, plus at least one comment on other students' posts.

Weekly quizzes - 30%. (10 @ 3% each)

- Twelve weekly quizzes will be completed, generally at the beginning of each weekly class. These will be brief (5-10 minutes) and include content from the previous week's lecture and textbook content.
- The ten quizzes for which you scored the highest will be counted; the two lowest scores will be dropped in an understanding that you may not be able to be present for every single lecture due to circumstances outside your control. Quizzes cannot be made up at a later date.

Group presentation - 11%.

- Groups will be established based on shared content from assignments.
- Maximum of five members per group.
- Presentations will cover content of one assignment, presented to the class during our final lecture.

GRADING SCALE



Course grades will be assigned on a distribution that is NOT more restrictive than the one below:

- As stated in the University Calendar, it is at the instructor's discretion to round off either upward or downward to determine a final grade when the average of term work and final examinations is between two letter grades.
- To determine final letter grades, final percentage grades will be rounded up or down to the nearest whole percentage (e.g., 89.5% will be rounded up to 90% = A, but 89.4% will be rounded down to 89% = A-).

Criteria for Letter Grades

- A+ grade: Exceptional Performance. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.
- A, A- range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.
- B range: Good Performance. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.
- C range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.
- D range: Marginally meets standards. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.
- F grade: Course standards not met. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.
