#### **DESCRIPTION**

"Are you joining us tonight?" "I have an exam at 8:00 am tomorrow..." If a friend responded like this to our invitation to go out, most of us would understand that they are not joining us tonight. But why? After all, they never said no explicitly. Pragmatics is the field of linguistics that studies language meaning and communication beyond what is linguistically encoded in an utterance. It includes speech acts, inferences, metaphor, irony and everything in-between. It is the study of language and communication in use.

#### **OBJECTIVES and OUTCOMES**

Students will familiarize themselves with relevant background, including theories, frameworks, and major debates in pragmatics. They will synthesize ideas and background information to hold informed discussions on the predictions and implications of pragmatic theories as well as the evidence necessary to support one over the other. By the end of the course, students should be able to distinguish between linguistically encoded meaning and pragmatic enrichments, as well as different kinds of pragmatically enriched meaning. They will also be able to apply the necessary theoretical tools for the analysis of various pragmatic enrichments.

### **COURSE NOTES**

The course is taught in person. Every week, students are asked to engage in the following activities: (1) do the relevant readings and (2) attend the in-person lectures. Roughly every two weeks, there will be a HW assignment on the material we have covered.

Students who cannot attend the lectures will need to take notes from their classmates. The lectures will not be recorded. Attendance is not required, but it is highly encouraged. Students' performance on assignments is typically negatively impacted by no/minimal attendance.

Course work is administered through D2L, is not timed and is always open-book. Requests for an extension in advance of the deadline will be considered and if approved, will incur no penalties. Late submissions without advance notice, will incur a 10% deduction per day late.



#### **ASSESSMENT**

**Assignments:** Students may have to complete multiple choice and brief essay questions on the material we have covered. The assignments are designed to help them review their knowledge and understanding, think critically and apply the theoretical tools we examine in class to linguistic/communicative material in order to analyze it from the perspective of pragmatics. **Assignments must be submitted through D2L by 11:59 pm the day they are due**. The HW due dates are tentative and subject to change to a later date (you will be notified of any revisions to the due dates on D2L, via email, and in class). Unexcused late submissions without advance notice, will incur a 10% deduction per day late.

**Discussion board entries:** Students will have to briefly answer discussion questions on the Discussion Forum on D2L. The posts are due by 11:59 pm the day they are due. Students will be assessed on their participation. Unexcused late submissions without advance notice will not be accepted.

**Final Assignment/Exam:** The final assignment/exam will be similar to the assignments, but cumulative, covering the entire semester. It will be due **at 11:59 on April 12, 2021**. Unexcused late submissions without advance notice will not be accepted.

#### **GRADING SCALE**

#### **Criteria for Letter Grades**

A+ grade: Exceptional Performance. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: *Excellent Performance*. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: Marginally meets standards. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: Course standards not met. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient



for course credit.
