DESCRIPTION

The course provides students with an introduction to the field of second language teaching and learning with a historical overview of the field. The course presents concepts from the related fields of applied linguistics, psychology and education. Students will have the opportunity to observe university language courses, analyze and develop language teaching materials, as well as writing a statement of teaching philosophy.

OBJECTIVES

- Overview of major language teaching methodologies and approaches through the ages.
- Understanding of how additional languages are learned and taught.
- Discussion of the ways in which theory has informed practice.
- Exploration of the teaching of reading, writing, listening, speaking, grammar and vocabulary.
- Review, assessment and design of classroom tasks.

OUTCOMES

By the end of the course, students will gain a greater understanding of research-informed language teaching.
