#### **DESCRIPTION**

In this course we will explore and contextualize the main characteristics of contemporary Spanish culture and society. We will delve into the socio-political changes that have taken place in Spain over the course of the last thirty years in order to better understand contemporary Spanish society, traditions, and values, as well as many other issues such as identity, nationalism/regionalism, politics, immigration patterns, and language policies.

### **OBJECTIVES**

- To discuss the political and social realities of contemporary Spain.
- To analyze the historical and socio-political factors that have helped shape Spanish identity.
- To introduce students to the main sectors and industries of the Spanish economy.
- To discuss issues such as immigration, unemployment, and regionalism.

## **OUTCOMES**

 By the end of the course students will be able to deliver a presentation comparing Spanish and Canadian societies regarding their respective linguistic policies, immigration, health care, education, tourism, etc.

### **COURSE NOTES**

## Class participation: It includes:

- a) Attendance in class via Zoom.
- b) Assignments based on articles or videos available on University of Malagá's Virtual Campus.

c) Asking questions and engaging in class discussions on a regular basis.

#### Debate

- Students will be required to participate in a debate based on the topics proposed by the professor. The debates will deal with several aspects of Spanish society and culture.
- Students will be assessed on their knowledge of the reading material, their understanding of the topic discussed, and on how they present and support their ideas.

## **Final Project**

- Students will prepare a class presentation on a topic associated with any of the themes listed in the course outline.
- Students are required to make an appointment with the professor to discuss the topic for their presentation. Based on the advice they receive from the professor, students will prepare and deliver a 15 to 20 minute in-class presentation where they will state the main ideas of the topic they have researched.
- The criteria for evaluation will include the ability to summarize the main points of the material they have done research on, analyze it, and deliver a clear presentation.
- Students may use videos, power point presentations or music to illustrate their main points.

### Test

There will be a test during the semester via D2L. The test is designed to take 50 minutes, but it will be available for **180 minutes on June 9**<sup>th</sup>. Students may choose when during the scheduled 24-hour period to take it. Additional instructions on how to take exams on *D2L* will be posted under the link EXAMEN on D2L.

### Zoom class etiquette

- Classes will be taught in Spanish.
- Students should conduct themselves appropriately during Zoom class sessions and remain in class during the entire 50 minutes.



- Students are expected to use both a microphone and their camera to interact with the professor and other students in class.
- Please mute yourself when you are not talking, in order to reduce background noise.
- If you are joining the Zoom session from a room that has other people in it, use headphones when possible.
- Leave your pets out of the room when you are attending a room session.
- During class, please only use technology as is relevant to class. Do not use technology for purposes not relevant to class (e.g. checking email and social media). Do not do other work for other classes during our Zoom sessions.

## Media policy

Most class sessions will not be recorded. On an occasion when a session is recorded, students will be informed at the start of recording and have an opportunity to give consent in Zoom. The recording will only be made available to other students in the course via D2L.
