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#### DESCRIPTION

This course, a continuation of RUSS 331, will further the students' knowledge of Russian grammar and vocabulary as well as develop their oral and written communication skills by immersing them in an authentic cultural context through reading, listening to and discussing both literary classics and modern writing, interviews and blogs.

This course may not be repeated for credit.

Prerequisite: Russian 331 or consent of the School.

### OBJECTIVES

The course will aim to develop students' competencies in five main communicative skills: listening, speaking, reading, writing and cultural sensitivity in Russian. Grammatically, the course will focus on the Russian morphosyntax, especially on adjectives, adverbial expressions, participles and gerunds. All grammar and vocabulary will be presented and practiced through communicative activities to expose students to Russian culture and deepen their understanding of situational language use.

### OUTCOMES

Students will make progress in the following areas:

**Listening** – enhance their understanding of everyday conversations in Russian, as well as more complex topical discussions;

**Speaking** – build confidence when speaking, better feel which vocabulary to use in a given context, achieve more precision when using Russian grammar;

**Reading** – improve their analytical skills when reading authentic Russian texts of different genres, expand their vocabulary on different topics;

Writing - compose Russian texts of intermediate difficulty;

**Culture** – easier find their bearings in a new cultural context, better understand registers and cultural information expressed in the Russian language.

- Late assignments and missed tests policy: Missed tests, quizzes and assignments will be given a grade of F unless a student can show that the absence was for legitimate reasons.



### ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:

a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);

b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;

c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or

d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
