COURSE OUTLINE

DESCRIPTION

A comprehensive course for students with no prior knowledge of Spanish, focused on listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills having to do with immediate needs in everyday situations. Emphasis on intercultural awareness of Spanish-speaking cultures.

OBJECTIVES

By the end of the course, students will increase their skills in listening comprehension, speaking, reading, writing, and cultural awareness and will be able to:

- Exchange essential information in basic oral and written conversations and presentations.
- Read and understand short, simple texts.
- Write simple paragraphs about themselves and others.
- Demonstrate limited control of the present indicative tense.
- Demonstrate awareness of Spanish-speaking cultures.

OUTCOMES

Outcomes in language courses are usually measured in terms of five basic skills:

Listening: You will understand, at least partially, audio and video material such as that which accompanies the textbook. However, in a simple face-to-face conversation, misunderstanding of both the main ideas and details can still arise on a fairly regular basis.

Speaking: You will be able to ask and answer simple questions using a very limited vocabulary concerning immediate surroundings; you are able to introduce yourself and talk about likes and dislikes, express plans and obligations and talk about everyday activities. However, you are not able to engage effectively in prolonged interactions with native speakers.

Reading: You will be able to understand the main ideas in simple authentic material (brochures, advertisement, schedules, and short newspaper articles) and to extract information from them by applying some reading strategies (identifying cognates, scanning, dealing with unfamiliar words, predicting, and activating background knowledge).

Writing: You will be able to write simple texts, such as e-mails, complete sentences and short paragraphs descriptions, to give information about yourself and to describe and narrate events grounded in personal experience.



Culture: You are able to understand some of the significant differences between Hispanic cultures and your own culture, in terms of behaviour, attitudes, and values. You have an awareness of language as an essential element of culture.

D2L Timed Exams (2x15%): 30%

Students will complete two tests during the semester via D2L to assess their progress with listening, grammar, vocabulary, reading, writing, and cultural knowledge. These exams will completed in person, during class time.

- D2L Timed Exam #1 (Covering Chapters 1 and 2) May 25
- D2L Timed Exam #2 (Covering Chapters 3, 4 and 5) June 15

Writing Projects (2×10%): 20%

Students will complete two short writing projects on topics related to themes covered in the textbook during the course. The writing projects will be assessed on technical accuracy (grammar, spelling, word choice) and content/creativity (does it make sense as a whole, does it successfully communicate to the reader, has the topic been approached in a thoughtful and interesting manner). Topics and detailed assessment criteria for the written assignments will be provided closer to the due dates. Note that online translators or other composition aids are not permitted; their use constitutes a violation of academic honesty.

- Writing Project #2 June 6

Fluency Project: 15%

Students will prepare and post a dialogue, video, or slide show (with recorded audio) with a partner/group to D2L. The fluency project will be due during the Final Exam period. More details will be provided closer to the due date.

• Fluency Project – June 20

Lectures Participation and Homework: 10%

Lecture sessions will be in person at the time scheduled by the Registrar for that section; attendance will be taken. Lecture sections are the majority of your instructed time. Lecture sessions will include a mixture of new material and opportunities to review key concepts from previous lectures. As active use of Spanish is the main goal of this course, students must come to class and be prepared to participate. Your course instructor will evaluate your readiness and participation in Lecture sessions.

In lecture sessions, students will be expected:

- Be prepared (complete homework, review material from previous sessions and stay up to date with the course content)
- Contribute to group and class discussions and activities.
- Complete group and individual tasks, such as short pieces of written work, grammar practice, oral or written summaries of group discussions or prepared readings, online research activities, among



other activities.

Students will see a weighted participation grade on D2L based on their work so far (the grade will be updated weekly).

Tutorials/Labs Participation: 10%

Students are expected to attend their assigned tutorial, follow the instructions of their instructor, and complete all activities. Attendance will be taken during each tutorial. These are designed to further skills developed in Spanish and review and practise the material covered in the course.

Students will see a weighted participation grade on D2L based on their work so far (the grade will be updated weekly).

Blink Quizzes (5×2%): 10%

Students will complete five short online quizzes on the Blink Learning Platform. These quizzes utilize a similar format to the tasks completed in class.

• Blink Quizzes - June 15

This assessment will be available from an earlier date.

Culture-Research Task: 5%

Students will engage with a selection of cultural topics and prepare a brief and record themselves reading this short text. Students will also produce a short reflection in English. The task prepares students for the Fluency Project and allows them to delve deeper into the culture of Spanish-speaking countries.

The course will utilize D2L as another venue for (optional) discussion of the texts and topics viewed in class.
