**DESCRIPTION**

An intermediate language and culture course that aims to boost language acquisition by consolidating and expanding the four language skills of listening, reading, speaking and writing. It includes a comprehensive review of the grammar studied at the beginners' level. Students will continue to explore cultural issues relevant to the Hispanic world.

The class is conducted in Spanish.

**Prerequisites:** SPAN 203 or consent of the Department

**Objectives**

In Span 301 you will develop both receptive (listening and reading) and productive (speaking and writing) skills as well as cultural awareness:

**Listening:** You will be able

- to understand the main points in the audio and video material of the Textbook and eSAM (Online Student Activities Manual)
- to participate in face-to face conversations which may require occasional repetition and rephrasing.

**Reading:** You will be able

- to understand the main ideas in authentic texts
- to apply an increasing number of reading strategies to derive additional meaning from texts so as to better understand the cultures and societies to which the texts refer.

**Speaking:** You will handle successfully a certain number of social situations. You will be able to:

- initiate and maintain face-to-face conversations on topics such as leisure-time activities, work-related activities, past events, personal feelings...
- express admiration, disapproval and surprise
- invite people to do certain activities; accept and refuse invitations
- ask and give permission
- express agreement and disagreement about topics of current interest

**Writing:** You will be able

- to write structured texts of several paragraphs in length such as letters and compositions

**Cultural awareness:** Throughout the study and discussion of topics dealing with Hispanic cultures, you will expand your cultural awareness which in turn should increase your sensitivity to cultural differences and your ability to speak and write about cultural differences.

#### **COURSE NOTES**

2. In class and during the tutorial you will be able to hear, speak and practice your Spanish and you can receive immediate feedback from your instructor and/or your peers. This is why lack of attendance may adversely affect your overall performance and may have a negative impact on your final grade.

4. Not all the material included in the required textbook package will be covered in class. You are encouraged to look over those sections on your own.

As this course focuses on a comprehensive review of the grammar studied at the beginners' level, it is the student responsibility to complete the activities assigned for each class, read in advance the texts from *Presentación del tema*, listen to the conversations from *Lengua Viva*, study the vocabulary sections, and bring questions to class for clarification. Do not expect to receive extensive grammatical explanations in class. Class time will instead be reserved for grammar exercises/activities, discussion of the readings and creative activities.

#### **LATE EXAMS AND MISSED ASSIGNMENTS POLICY**

1. 5% of the grade will be deducted for each day a written assignment (activity or composition) is late if there is no appropriate documentation to justify the absence or the failure to complete it. The Department's drop-box, located in the foyer area of the third floor in Craigie Hall between blocks D and C, is available for dropping off assignments and course work. The material placed in the drop-box will be collected and date-stamped at the beginning and at the end of the working day.
2. Failure to attend class on the day of an exam will result in an F unless the student has legitimate reasons. The instructor may request a Physician/ Counselor statement form to confirm an absence for health reasons. A student who is absent from a test for legitimate reasons must discuss an alternative course of action with the instructor.
3. Failure to show up for the oral assessment will result in an F.
4. Do not make travel arrangements for the dates when exams and compositions are scheduled. As stated above, missed tests, presentations, assignments and examinations with no legitimate reason will be given a grade of F.

## **ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT**

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:

- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
