DESCRIPCIÓN DE LA MATERIA DEL CURSO:

Esta asignatura se ha diseñado para mejorar tanto el nivel como la calidad de la escritura en español del alumno/de la alumna mediante el análisis de varios tipos diferentes de textos. Dichos textos provienen de los campos del periodismo, de la historia del arte, de la literatura española y universal, de la radio, del internet, del cine español, del ensayo, de la historia intelectual y de otras fuentes. El alumno o la alumna tendrá la obligación continua de escribir todo tipo de prosa expositiva –una autobiografía, reseñas de artículos de periódico, esquemas y ensayos-- ya a partir del primer día de clase. Asimismo cada uno o cada una se verá obligada a estudiar al fondo el libro de gramática básica del español que se ha pedido.

El alumno o la alumna siempre tiene la opción de reescribir cualquier trabajo escrito y luego devolverlo, así corregido y enmendado, al profesor. En caso de que la segunda o subsiguiente versión sea muy superior a la primera, el trabajo sacará la nota de $\sqrt{+}$; si es sólo algo superior, sacará una $\sqrt{+/-}$; si es excepcional, sacará una $\sqrt{++}$. A fin de curso, para confeccionar la nota final, se tomarán en cuenta las notas de $\sqrt{+}$ y $\sqrt{++}$ además de todas las otras notas recibidas.

PREREQUISITOS: Haber completado Español 301 con una nota mínima de C-, o autorización del departamento. Sin embargo, se recomienda que el alumno haya cursado con éxito Español303 o su equivalente. Los alumnos o las alumnas que hayan cursado ya cualesquier asignaturas a nivel de 400 **NO** pueden cursar esta materia. Se puede cursar Español 323 y 405 simultáneamente.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:

- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
