

# SPAN 407 Critical Thinking in Spanish, WINTER 2020, WEB BASED

### **DESCRIPTION:**

Our modern times are characterized by the abundance of information that come to us in many forms: visual, auditive, electronic, etc. More than ever before in history, everyone faces a daily overload of data that must be either accepted as valid or rejected as fake. The same is true for students at the university level. Each student has the privilege and the responsibility to examine, analyze, and organize data, and to produce arguments, either orally or in the form of written documents, that reflect phenomena of daily life in an unbiased way. In order to achieve this goal, students need to learn *Critical Thinking*; defined as the cognitive ability of reflection, evaluation and criticism of objects presented to us by the arts, the humanities, and the sciences, e.g., images, literature, philosophical reflections, inventions, artifacts, etc. This course addresses the question of what Critical thinking is in the context of the Spanish language and what its role is in university education.

### **OBJECTIVES:**

The main objective is to help students acquire analytical and critical skills that will enable them to comprehend the elements involved in the creation and production of works of literature and visual arts, primarily, in the context of the Hispanic culture and literature. The student will learn to discover the methods and strategies that authors use in the making of their works of arts, in order to interpret the message or messages that their creators wanted to convey. To achieve this goal, concepts of historical, cultural and discursive analysis issues will be introduced, in addition to the revision of the main elements of grammar and language to enlarge and enhance the lexical, and grammatical knowledge of students.

### **OUTCOMES:**

Upon successful completion of the course, the students will have developed their critical, analytical, and intellectual skills, which in turn will help them express their opinion in oral and written form.

The students, when presented with textual and information overload challenges, will be able to think independently in a reasoning manner to arrive to well thought-out academic positions. They will be able



to present logical arguments and solutions to be part of the ongoing academic and social discussions. Students will be able to write well developed essays and also to present convincing oral presentations. With the set of tools acquired in this 400-level course, the students will have a more secure base to continue their upper level studies.

#### **COURSE NOTES**

- **Important dates**: First day of class: Jan 12, 2021. Last day of class: April 15, 2021. Term break, no class: Sunday-Saturday, February 14-20.
- The delivery language of classes will be Spanish. Students are encouraged to make an effort to use Spanish in all course activities. However, students can ask for clarifications in English when concepts are not clearly understood.
- The classes will be delivered online via Zoom app.
- There will be UNOFFICIAL zoom sessions on Tuesdays and Thursday (some weeks) from 2:00 pm to 3:15 pm (75 minutes total each). You are welcome to attend at your own discretion.
- Since there is no class participation in this course, you can watch the class sessions either synchronously or asynchronously. However, because of the sequential nature of the knowledge and information considered in each session; and because of time sensitive details (deadlines of assignments, discussions, homework, etc.), you are advised to watch and study the video sessions within 24-36 hours of being published.
- All assignments and texts will be submitted to the appropriate D2L tab. The use of online translators is not permitted, and any assignments which utilize a translator will result in a grade of zero for that assignment. Instead, use what you have learned in the textbook and use an online dictionary.
- Concerning the deadlines of activities and exams, please let your instructor know immediately if you
  cannot meet the assignment deadlines specified or if you cannot take an assessment at the specified
  class time, so that the Instructor can work with you to consider alternative dates/assessments. A



deduction of 10% of the mark will be applied for late assignment submissions when a strong reason for the absence is not given. An assignment will not be accepted after three days from the due day.

- If you will be present at the synchronous sessions, please give your full attention to the class and follow the instructions set out by your instructor. Participate actively, appropriately and respectfully in all class discussions, including in the Zoom breakout rooms and when completing group projects. Please show up on time to class and leave when class ends. Turn your camera on at the beginning of class and wear appropriate clothing. Turn your camera off and mute when asked. Use the raise hand function in Zoom if you have a question.
- If you watch the Zoom sessions asynchronously, please follow all instruction provided in the video and meet all deadlines.
- Media policy in case of recording: The class sessions may be recorded and posted to D2L. You are not permitted to share these recordings with anyone not enrolled in the course.
- Course evaluation procedure: Assessments will all be online via D2L
- Students are expected to be respectful in any communication with classmates and with the instructor.

## **ASSESSMENT DETAILS**

**Homework activities.** The material for homework will be based on information considered in-class. Each activity will be presented in written form with a maximum of 500 words. Your written answers will be evaluated considering the factual information provided, your argumentation and your good use of Spanish grammar and vocabulary. An appropriate rubric will be published on D2L.

**Discussion Forum Activities:** You'll be assigned to a discussion group of 4 students. You will be given a theme (subject) and will collaboratively work out a proper analysis so that you can provide acceptable comments, arguments or solutions. You will contact the members of your group (email, or text) to discuss the assigned material, then each member will publish their conclusions asynchronously to the Discussion forum. Marks will



be assigned individually depending on your participation (qualitative and quantitative). An appropriate rubric will be posted on D2L.

**Oral presentation:** Each student will prepare an oral presentation based on material studied in the course. It could be a theoretical issue concerning *Critical Thinking*, or a consideration of a literary text analyzed in a critical way. Each student will have 7 minutes to present their argument + 4 minutes to answer students questions. An appropriate rubric will be published on D2L.

**Test.** Two tests have been programmed during the course semester to test your comprehension of the material studied in the class. The tests will be completed vis a D2L link and may include a variety of question formats: written response, multi-select, multiple choice. You will be giving a 24-hour window of opportunity to start your test. Once you start your test you will have 112 minutes (1.875 hours) to finish your test (this is according to University of Calgary regulations which stipulates that your test time should be calculated according to the following formula: class time + 50% = exam time). You may use your textbook when taking these quizzes. Do not use an online translator. Do not consult with any other individuals.

**Final work:** Each student will prepare a final written work which will be presented in the form of an essay. Each student will choose a Spanish literary text contained in the textbook used in class. The student will design the essay using the tools taught in class: brainstorming, organization of ideas, proposal of a thesis, argumentation, writing, editing, inclusion of a bibliography. Each submission will be evaluated on the merits of each of the aforementioned elements. An appropriate rubric will be published on D2L.

- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

- 2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
