DESCRIPTION

This course explores one of the recurring themes in the study of Hispanic literatures through the analysis of major texts of the Hispanic tradition from the 15th to the 17th centuries. Classroom discussion will provide grounds to facilitate a deeper understanding of the different narratives surrounding the conquest such as the relationship between literature and history during the first encounters among the Old and the New World. Key works of prose from various cultures of Spanish America as well as films related to the topics under study will be explored. Authors include Columbus, Hernán Cortés, Bernal Díaz, Guamán Poma, Inca Garcilaso, Las Casas, among others. Course will be conducted in Spanish.

Objectives. Some of the objectives of this course include:

To obtain a general overview of the literary production in Latin American from the Pre-Hispanic period to the present. To understand the Latin American Literary production as a whole, with its own characteristics and personality. The understanding of connections between history and literature within social and cultural contexts.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

- 1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

- 2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
- 3.
