**Descripción de la materia:** Español 505 es una materia de lengua española a nivel avanzado. En esta asignatura el/la estudiante seguirá desarrollando las competencias comunicativas, tanto lingüísticas como pragmáticas) así como las competencias generales (socioculturales y estratégicas). Para lograr ello, el/la estudiante tendrá la oportunidad para ampliar su dominio del léxico español, además de interpretar y luego producir textos escritos y orales con los cuatro ámbitos en que se organiza la vida social (personal, público, educativo y profesional), así conforme a las orientaciones del *Marco común europeo* de referencia para el nivel C1. Esta asignatura incluye asimismo un proyecto final, tal vez interdisciplinario, que permitirá al alumno poner en práctica las habilidades y los conocimientos tanto en el área en la que se especializa en la universidad como en otras disciplinas que han sido objeto de estudio o interés a lo largo de su carrera.

**Objetivos académicos de la materia**

**Competencias lingüísticas:** Para desarrollar las competencias gramaticales el/la estudiante repasará las oraciones complejas presentadas en el libro de texto. También ampliará las competencias léxica y semántica en distintos campos, como los medios de comunicación, las actividades de ocio, la vida laboral y familiar, y la vida social.

**Competencias pragmáticas:**

Para seguir refinando sus competencias funcionales en la lengua, se ampliará el repertorio de medios para expresar sentimientos, por ejemplo como para proponer, aceptar o rechazar un ofrecimiento, para invitar, para pedir y denegar permiso, para advertir, amenazar, prohibir. Asimismo se interpretarán distintos tipos de textos orales y escritos.

**Competencias generales:**

El/la alumno(-a) seguirá enriqueciendo sus conocimientos culturales y socioculturales sobre el mundo hispano mientras al desarrolla su capacidad de aprendizaje del español mediante la aplicación de determinadas estrategias docentes.

Español 405, 407, 421 y/o 423 (en los que se necesita haber sacado por lo menos una nota de C-) o mediante permiso de un encargado del departamento.

**ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT**

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
  - a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
  - b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
  - c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
  - d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
