DESCRIPTION

En este curso se estudiará cómo otros géneros discursivos de la época (por ej., la cosmografía, la medicina, la filosofía natural, la tratadística sobre el honor y la moralidad, etc.) contribuían a la creación literaria. Se verá esta influencia no sólo en el nivel referencial de las obras de teatro, prosa y poesía que se estudiarán, sino también en el nivel discursivo. Así se espera llegar a entender cómo los grandes cambios genéricos que tenían lugar en el mundo hispánico en los siglos XVI y XVII, sobre todo en la invención de la novela moderna y en la creación de un teatro popular y secularizado, se estriba no sólo de innovaciones literarias sino también de un ámbito discursivo y social que abarcaba todo un abanico de prácticas de escribir (géneros) y formas de saber (ciencias).

Objectives

Entender mejor la historia, cultura y literatura de la época; entender cómo funcionan los discursos; mejorar el análisis del discurso; mejorar la comunicación en español.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

- 1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

- 2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
- 3. Other academic misconduct includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
- 4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
